Frank Chamberlain read the Opening Statement:

OLD BUSINESS

Goodwill Park Project update - Mark Frank

Mr. Frank presented updates on:

- Goodwill Park. Due to some obstacles the potential Parks request we discussed will not be ready for fall construction, but is planned for spring.
- Mayflower Landing. Residents of the development have noted that a playground would be useful. Mr. Frank and the Parks Department decided to pause and gather more information about the best use for that space.

• 260 Woodland Street. There is a huge demand for pickleball courts, which may become an MIAA sport next year. Four courts with parking would fit in that space, which is across from the schools. This may be the subject of a future request.

Historical Society Requests

Asa Whiting House Ell Painting

Mr. Saulnier presented the request from the Historical Society for assistance repairing and repainting the rear ell of the Asa Whiting House. Total Project Cost: \$14,000 **CPA Funds Requested: \$11,000**

Non-CPA Funding Sources: \$3,000 CPA Percent: 78% The Historical Society itself repaired structural problems three years ago.

MOTION to accept the proposal to recommend the expenditure of \$11k in Historical preservation funding to repair and repaint the ell of the Asa Whiting house. Sunset date of June 30, 2024. Mr. Zeamer

Whiting Barn Cornice Repairs

Total Project Cost: \$4,325

CPA Funds Requested: \$3,325

Non-CPA Funding Sources: \$1,000

CPA Percent: 77%

Mr. Chamberlain reminded the Committee that the CPA strongly recommends finalizing a preservation restriction on the property. Mr. Chamberlain had distributed samples from other towns. He can create a draft, which Attorney Bill Mayer will look over.

NEW BUSINESS

Mr. Chamberlain is working with the Planning Board and Housing Authority to fill the two current openings on the CPC.

There was a discussion of short and long term planning for the Town and the CPC. Mr. Chamberlain mentioned that there has not been any activity coming from Housing to the Committee recently. He has reached out to Brian Clancy and is awaiting a response. He is interested in hearing what the town thinks of the projects the CPC is doing.

Mr. Chamberlain may ask someone from the Community Preservation Coalition to visit to present the latest developments, since CPA funds are matched by the State. Mr. Chamberlain explained how the CPC's share of funding works in Holliston, at 1.5% rather than 3%, and divided between all the communities that have been joining the pool. Mr. Chamberlain will reach out to Stuart Saginor to see what might be available for a community forum in the next few months.

Mr. Rutberg asked if the CPA could be used for climate resilience. Mr. Chamberlain agreed that could be a possibility. He noted that Open Space has been changed before, adding recreation to accommodate needs of less rural communities.
