HOLLISTON – At a May 12 meeting of the Board of Health, the board voted to amend their April 28 requirement for anyone in Holliston who needs to be outside of their home to wear a face covering. After discussion and reviewing the Executive Order issued by the Governor on May 1, the board voted:

- All members of the public aged 5 years of age and older entering an essential business as defined by Governor Baker's *COVID-19 Executive Orders*, including but not limited to grocery stores, pharmacies, home improvement stores and the like must wear a face covering, such as fabric mask, scarf or bandana, over his or her nose and mouth. All members of the public aged 5 years of age and older entering a restaurant for the purpose of picking up food for take-out must wear a face covering over their nose and mouth.
- All grocery stores, retail stores and food service establishment staff must wear a face covering. Gloves must be readily available and used as necessary to avoid touching "ready to eat foods." Glove use is not a substitution for frequent hand washing or use of hand sanitizer. All other employees of all essential businesses shall wear a face covering over their mouth and nose when interacting with the public and within six feet of a co-worker.
- Any resident or member of the general public aged 5 years of age and older entering or exiting a residential or commercial building complex of greater than one (1) unit must wear a face covering over their nose and mouth while in common areas and communal spaces and must exercise social distancing in those spaces in accordance with the *Centers for Disease Control and Prevention* (CDC) guidelines.
- Face coverings must be worn in or at all public spaces such as parks, sidewalks, streets, paths *(including but not limited to the Rail Trail)*, squares, or outdoor commercial areas such as parking lots and outdoor premises of retail locations *when individuals are unable to or do not maintain physical distancing of approximately six feet*. Joggers and cyclists must adhere to the order along with pedestrians.



All open businesses must also display signs reminding anyone entering that they need to be wearing a face covering. While face coverings can help control the spread of COVID-19, Cassidy reminds the public that it is an extra protection to supplement physical distancing to help reduce transmission of the virus. Use of facial coverings do not make it safe for people to start congregating; the Governor's closure of non-essential businesses and stay at home advisory has been extended to May 18.

During the meeting of the board, Cassidy emphasized that per the *Centers for Disease Control and Prevention* (CDC) <u>face covering guidelines</u>, face coverings should not be placed on young children under 2 years old, anyone who has trouble breathing, or is unconscious, incapacitated or otherwise unable to remove the mask without assistance.

The amended emergency order shall be effective beginning Wednesday, May 13, 2020 and remain in effect until notice is given, pursuant to the Board of Health's judgment that the public health emergency no longer exists. To the extent necessary, Board of Health officials shall enforce this order.

The Health Department will update and share new information with the community, as necessary, regarding the coronavirus situation.
