You're eligible to get a booster shot if:

- It's been at least 6 months since you got the second dose of a Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna vaccine AND you are:
 - 65 years or older;
 - A long-term care resident or staff member;
 - 18+ and have an <u>underlying</u> <u>medical condition</u>, including asthma, diabetes, and obesity; or
 - 18+ and work or live in highrisk settings, including health care workers, teachers, and grocery store workers.

OR:

 You're 18+ and it's been at least 2 months since you got a dose of Johnson & Johnson's Janssen vaccine.



If you're eligible for a booster, you may choose which vaccine to receive as a booster dose. Your booster shot doesn't have to be the same vaccine you received before.

You're eligible to get a booster shot if:

- It's been at least 6 months since you got the second dose of a Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna vaccine;
- You're at least 18 years old; and
- You're at increased risk for severe COVID-19 because of an underlying medical condition.

Such conditions include:

- Cancer
- Chronic kidney disease
- Chronic lung diseases, including COPD (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease), asthma, interstitial lung disease, cystic fibrosis, and pulmonary hypertension
- Dementia or other neurological conditions

- Type 1 or 2 diabetes
- Down syndrome
- Heart conditions (such as heart failure, coronary artery disease, cardiomyopathies, or hypertension)
- HIV infection
- Liver disease
- Overweight and obesity
- Pregnancy
- Sickle cell disease or thalassemia.
- Smoking, current or former
- Solid organ or blood stem cell transplant
- Stroke or cerebrovascular disease, which affects blood flow to the brain
- Substance use disorders

You're eligible to get a booster shot if:

- It's been at least 6 months since you got the second dose of a Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna vaccine;
- You're at least 18 years old; and
- You work in certain high-risk settings.

Examples include:

- First responder (such as firefighter or police officer)
- · Health care worker
- Education staff (such as teacher, support staff, or daycare worker)
- Food and agriculture worker
- Factory worker
- Corrections worker
- U.S. Postal Service worker
- Public transportation worker
- Grocery store worker



You're eligible to get a booster shot if:

- It's been at least 6 months since you got the second dose of a Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna vaccine;
- You're at least 18 years old; and
- You live or work in any of the following places:
 - Nursing home
 - Skilled nursing facility
 - Assisted living facility
 - Residential care facility
 - Continuing care retirement community
 - Correctional facility
 - Homeless shelter



Most Children and All Teens Can Get COVID-19 Vaccines

CDC recommends everyone ages 5 and older get a COVID-19 vaccine to help protect against COVID-19.
